#### **Introduction**

Can we pray the way Bartimaeus prays? People try to hush him up because by addressing Jesus as "Son of David" he is making a politically dangerous claim that Jesus is the rightful king. Could our prayers ever be heard as a threat to unjust powers that be? Bartimaeus won't give up or go away quietly, but repeats his call for help more loudly. Do we ask so boldly? And are our prayers an honest answer to Jesus' question, "What do you want me to do for you?"

# Second Reading: Romans 3:19-28

Paul's words stand at the heart of the preaching of Martin Luther and other Reformation leaders. No human beings make themselves right with God through works of the law. We are brought into a right relationship with God through the divine activity centered in Christ's death. This act is a gift of grace that liberates us from sin and empowers our faith in Jesus Christ.


# R: A reading from Romans, the third chapter.

- <sup>19</sup> Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. <sup>20</sup> For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.
- <sup>21</sup> But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, <sup>22</sup> the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, <sup>23</sup> since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; <sup>24</sup> they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, <sup>25</sup> whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; <sup>26</sup> it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

<sup>27</sup> Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. <sup>28</sup> For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law. The word of the Lord.

Bartimaeus comes to Jesus with faith, asking that he might see again. Recognizing Jesus' identity, Bartimaeus is the first person to call him "Son of David" in the Gospel of Mark.

P: <sup>46</sup> As [Jesus] and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. <sup>47</sup> When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" <sup>48</sup> Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" <sup>49</sup> Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." <sup>50</sup> So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. <sup>51</sup> Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." <sup>52</sup> Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.] The Gospel of the Lord.



#### **GOSPEL MESSAGE**

#### October 27, 2024

#### Hear Me, O God!

This week we get a beautiful little glimpse of scripture that mirrors real life. Here is Bartimaeus, shouting to be heard. The crowd tries to shush him, but it just emboldens him to be louder. Perhaps you can relate: Have you ever seen a child trying to get their parent's attention, tugging on their pant leg and getting louder by the minute?

In worship it might feel like we are stuck in a "groundhog's day" kind of repetition, trying to get God's attention: "O Lord, have mercy on us! Bring your justice. Bring your peace. Forgive us." Week after week, most of the liturgy we hear, speak, and sing together is the same. The needs in the world around us seem constant, and sometimes it feels like God is ignoring our requests. And yet, this gospel story is a good reminder that repetition is not a bad thing.

Jesus stands still, calls Bartimaeus over, and asks him what he needs. In the end, not only can Bartimaeus see again, but he begins to follow Jesus.

Liturgy—the word means "the work of the people"—is essential to who we are as Christian community. Within our worship each week, we give voice to what is in our hearts and minds, entrusting it all to God's care. The repetition might feel tedious, and it is hard to trust the slow work of God. But perhaps hearing these words over and over again shapes us into seeing God more clearly in our everyday life. As we continue to show up and ask for Christ's mercy, perhaps our ears and hearts become more open to listening to our neighbors' voices as well—especially those who are marginalized and sidelined in our midst: people of color, women, those who are differently abled, and even our little ones. How can we have empathy for those who have to speak louder and more often just to be seen and heard?
